"O" Antiphons

Yes, you read the title right. That's "O" the letter of the alphabet that most reminds us of breakfast cereal, tires, doughnuts, hula-hoops, nohitters, and Advent. In many parishes, "O" is the first word said in the new Church year. Actually, we sing it in Advent's most popular song, "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel." It announces the season that anticipates the coming of Christ at Christmas. This hymn is used to announce that Advent was ending. The last eight days of Advent form a little "season" all by themselves. As the Church prepares for the birthday of Christ, the liturgy gets more intense. At daily Mass, the Gospels relate the events leading up to the first Christmas. At Evening Prayer, we have a special series of antiphons that beckon the Messiah to come. Each night gives him a new name, drawn from the Old Testament. "O Wisdom," "O Sacred Lord," "O Flower of Jesse's Stem," "O Key of David," "O Radiant Dawn," "O King of All Nations," and the greatest of them all, "O Emmanuel," a name that means "God is with us." For reasons that will be immediately obvious, we call that group of refrains the O Antiphons, a hallmark of Advent, and a collection of music our church has treasured for many generations. The Mass now includes a version of them as the alleluia verses for the same eight days before Christmas. By the Middle Ages, those seven antiphons got strung together into a popular hymn. The last one became verse one, and "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" was born. Thus, the antiphon originally established for the last evening before Christmas Eve is now often sung to begin Advent. That "O," of course, simply tells us that we're talking to someone. It's like saying, "Hey, you." Only more politely. But "O" reminds us of much more. It makes us think of something having no beginning and no end. Like love or an Advent wreath. It resembles the shape of our mouth and the sound we make when we face a mystery we cannot fully comprehend.

THE SACRAMENT OF PENANCE

WHAT?

The way we embrace Christ's call to conversion.

The step we take to express true repentance for our offenses.

The **confession** of our sins.

The reception of **God's pardon and peace**.

The **restoration** of our relationship with God and with the Church. After Jesus declared that
Peter would be the rock
upon which he would build
his Church, he said to Peter,
"I will give you the keys to the
kingdom of heaven.
Whatever you bind on earth
shall be bound in heaven;
and whatever you loose on earth
shall be loosed in heaven."
(Mt 16:13-20)



After his resurrection,
Jesus appeared to his disciples,
extended his peace,
breathed the holy Spirit on them,
and sent them out saying,
"Whose sins you forgive
are forgiven them,
and whose sins you retain
are retained."
(Jn 20:19-23)

WHY?

We were born with the effects of **original sin**: disobedience toward God and a lack of trust in his goodness (Gen 3:1-11).

God the Father sent his Son, **Jesus Christ**, to save us from our sins (Jn 3:16).

Jesus accomplished his saving mission by establishing the **Kingdom of God** and by suffering, dying on the cross, rising from the dead, and ascending into heaven (Mt 5:17).

Jesus established the **Church** to continue his saving mission by the power of the Holy Spirit through the celebration of the sacraments (Mk 1:15, Jn 19:34, Acts 2: 1-4, 2 Cor 5:18).

Through faith in the Gospel and Baptism, we are first washed clean of all sin (Acts 2:38).

Through the **Sacrament of Penance**, we continue to experience the forgiveness of our sins (Mt 16:13-20, Jn 20:19-23).

How?

THE ORDER OF PENANCE

The Church celebrates the Sacrament of Penance using the *Order of Penance*.

The revised rites and formulas of the *Order of Penance* of the Second Vatican Council were promulgated in 1973.

A new translation was provided in 2023.

Celebrating the Sacrament of Penance or "going to confession" is a liturgical action that consists of:

- 1. The Reception of the Penitent
- The Reading of the Word of God (Optional)
- 3. The Confession of Sins and The Acceptance of Satisfaction
- 4. The Prayer of the Penitent and The Absolution
- The Proclamation of Praise of God and The Dismissal of the Penitent

THE ACTS OF THE PENITENT

- Contrition (sorrow for sin)
- Confession (inward examination, outward accusation)
- Satisfaction (an act of penance)

"Penance requires . . . the sinner to endure all things willingly, be contrite of heart, confess with the lips, and practice complete humility and fruitful satisfaction."



(Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1450)

Going to Confession in Twelve Easy Steps

- 1. Examine your conscience, call to mind your sins, and then enter the confessional.
- 2. The priest will welcome and receive you.
- Make the sign of the cross and say: "In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen."
- 4. The priest will invite you to trust in God. He may also read a text of Sacred Scripture.
- Say these or similar words:
- "Bless me Father for I have sinned. It has been ____long since my last confession. These are my sins..."
- 6. Tell the priest your sins. Then say these or similar words: "For these and all of my sins, I am sorry."
- Accept your work of penance (prayers, act of kindness, etc.) to help make satisfaction and amend your life.
- 8. Express your sorrow for your sins (Act of Contrition) in these or similar words:

"O my God, I am sorry and repent with all my heart for all the wrong I have done

and for the good I have failed to do,

because by sinning I have offended you,

who are all good and worthy to be loved above all things.

I firmly resolve, with the help of your grace, to do penance, to sin no more, and to avoid the occasions of sin.

Through the merits of the Passion of our Savior Jesus Christ, Lord, have mercy."

- 9. Receive God's forgiveness as the priest prays the Prayer of Absolution.
- At the end of the Prayer of Absolution, reply: "Amen."
- 11. Give praise to God. When the priest says: "Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good," conclude: "For his mercy endures forever."
- 12. Go in peace and remember to say or do your penance.

GAUDETE SUNDAY

The season of Advent is a time of waiting and preparation, a time for reflection and hope as Christians prepare for the coming of the Lord. Within this solemn framework, the third Sunday of Advent, known as Gaudete Sunday, stands out with a special note of joy. But what exactly does this day mean, and why is it so important?

What Is Gaudete Sunday?

The name "Gaudete" comes from the first word in Latin of the Introit of the Mass for this day:

"Gaudete in Domino semper: iterum dico, gaudete", which translates to "Rejoice in the Lord always; again I say, rejoice" (Philippians 4:4). This verse, taken from the words of St. Paul, encapsulates the spirit of the day: an invitation to joy in the midst of waiting.

Gaudete Sunday is celebrated on the third Sunday of Advent and marks a shift in the tone of the liturgical season. While the first two Sundays of Advent have a more penitential and preparatory character, this Sunday offers a respite, a moment to rejoice in the nearness of Christmas.

The Liturgical Joy of Gaudete Sunday

On this day, the liturgical color changes from purple (a symbol of penance) to rose, a color that reflects joy and gladness. The priest may wear rose vestments, and the third candle of the Advent wreath, which is also rose-colored, is lit to highlight this change.

Gaudete Sunday is not just a reminder of the joy that comes with the proximity of Christ's birth but also a teaching about the nature of true Christian joy. It is not about superficial happiness but a deep and lasting joy that springs from our relationship with God.

History and Theological Context

Gaudete Sunday has ancient roots in the Church. During Advent, the early Church established a time of fasting and penance similar to Lent. However, to encourage the faithful, a day of relief was introduced, a moment to remember the joy we anticipate in the coming of the Lord.

Theologically, Gaudete Sunday invites us to reflect on the balance between penance and joy.

Advent is not just a time of austere preparation; it is also a time to experience the joyful anticipation of the fulfilled promise: the coming of Christ as the light of the world.

St. Augustine wrote about this Christian joy, reminding us that joy is not found in the fleeting pleasures of the world but in the eternal love of God. In this context, Gaudete Sunday is a reminder that even amid our struggles and sacrifices, we can find comfort and joy in the hope of salvation.

Relevance for Today's World

In a world full of uncertainty, anxiety, and distractions, the message of Gaudete Sunday resonates with special

strength. It invites us to pause and remember that the source of our joy is not found in material things but in our relationship with God and the fulfillment of His promises.

Christian joy does not ignore the difficulties of life; it transcends them. This joy is a spiritual strength that sustains us in times of trial and inspires us to be witnesses of hope in a world that often seems to lose it. In a social context where many people seek happiness in external achievements or possessions, Gaudete Sunday offers a radical alternative: a joy that does not depend on external circumstances but on the living presence of Christ in our lives.

Practical Applications of Gaudete Sunday

Cultivate Gratitude: Take a moment to reflect on the blessings in your life. Gratitude is a doorway to true joy. Make a list of things you are thankful for and offer a prayer of thanksgiving.

- Bring Joy to Others: Share the joy of Advent with those around you. This can be through simple acts such as offering a smile, listening to someone in need, or sharing a gesture of generosity with those less fortunate.
- Strengthen Hope: Amid challenges, remember St. Paul's words: "Rejoice in the Lord always."
 Dedicate time to prayer and Scripture reading to renew your hope in God's promises.
- Prepare Your Heart: Use this time to examine your relationship with God. If possible, participate in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. The joy of a heart reconciled with God is a special gift of Advent.
- Reflect the Light of Christ: Like the rose-colored candle on the Advent wreath, be a reflection of Christ's light in the world. In your home, community, and workplace, strive to be a living testimony of Christian joy.

A Final Call to Joy

Gaudete Sunday is much more than a special day on the liturgical calendar. It is an invitation

to live Advent with a heart full of hope and joy. It reminds us that, even in waiting, there are

reasons to celebrate because the Lord is near.
