Presider's Chair

A chair is more than a piece of furniture. It can also symbolize the person who sits there. In many homes, a family member has a preferred chair, and others won't sit there out of respect. In offices, in boardrooms, and even at the dining room table, some seats are just sacred. At church, the presider's chair is more than a chair. It symbolizes the priest. He doesn't just sit there. He stands there to lead the assembly in prayer. The priest who presides at Mass, stands at the chair for the Introductory Rites, sits in the chair for the Scripture readings, and may stand at the chair again for the Prayer after Communion and the Concluding Rites. He may also preach from the chair if he wishes. A typical sanctuary contains three distinct areas designated by furniture: the altar, the ambo, and the chair. The altar gathers us together for the Eucharistic Prayer, the heart of the Mass. The ambo holds the Scriptures for the Liturgy of the Word. The presider's chair focuses our attention at the beginning and at the end of Mass because it estab lishes the role of one who leads us in prayer. In the early Church, the chair was positioned in the apse behind the altar. When the altar was moved to the back wall, the chair was relocated to one side of the sanctuary, facing the opposite side. Today the presider faces the assembly from the chair. It may be placed against the back wall. In churches where the tabernacle occupies that space, the chair should stand to the side. The presider's chair should not seem too remote from the assembly because the priest is not a performer to be watched, but a leader engaged with all those gathered together. Ideally, the position and structure of his chair identifies the priest as one with the people, yet also as their leader.





Care for Creation in Action

In 2017 the Diocese of Burlington, Vermont celebrated a Year of Creation. The Year included creationthemed liturgies, a Catholic schools' ecological awareness and action project, an ecological justice conference and an initiative to "Laudato Si-ify your Advent." The Season of Creation: September 1 – October 4

The Season of Creation spans five weeks between the World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation (September 1) and the Feast Day of St. Francis of Assisi (October 4). This "time for creation" offers, in the words of Pope Francis, "individual believers and communities a fitting opportunity to reaffirm their personal vocation to be stewards of creation, to thank God for the wonderful handiwork which he has entrusted to our care, and to implore his help for the protection of creation as well as his pardon for the sins committed against the world in which we live." Below are some ways to live out these three dimensions of Pope Francis' call, both as individuals and as a community.

1. Reaffirm Our Vocation as Stewards of Creation

As individuals and families: Counteract the "Throwaway Culture"

In Laudato Si', Pope Francis brings attention to our "throwaway culture," which "quickly reduces things to rubbish" (no. 22). In your daily life, try to identify the ways in which you can choose

reusables, rather than disposables, such as coffee mugs, reusable bags, or cloth napkins, and commit to making

one change during this month.

As a community: Educational Program

Use the educational program "Let Us Sow Hope" from the Catholic Climate Covenant to reflect on our vocation as stewards of creation. The program is designed to help us become instruments of God's peace and commit to climate actions as a way to avoid climate despair and sow climate hope. Click here to access this resource.



2. Thank God for His Wonderful Handiwork



As individuals and families: Meal Prayer
Before and after meals, say a short
prayer of thanksgiving for the lifegiving
food that sustains and nourishes us.
Briefly consider how all nourishment
ultimately comes from the earth, and
give thanks for all the human hands that
helped bring this food to your table.
May we recognize, as Laudato Si' has

taught us, that this "moment of blessing, however brief, reminds us of our dependence on God for life" (no. 227).

Here are a few suggestions from the Diocese of Stockton, California on how to care for creation:

- Buy Fair Trade
 products to
 support local
 artisans and
 farmers and protect
 the environment.
- Store food in reusable containers, not plastic wrap or foil, to reduce waste.
- Avoid using
 Styrofoam at your parish functions.
 Styrofoam can rarely be recycled, and it takes 500 years to decompose in landfills!

As a community: Eucharistic Adoration

One of the most meaningful ways we give thanks as Christians is through the sacrament of the Eucharist, a word which means "thanksgiving." As *Laudato Si*' proclaims, through the Eucharist, "the whole cosmos gives thanks to God" (no. 236). To celebrate this sacred reality during the Season of Creation, we recommend hosting a one-hour, care for creation-themed Eucharistic adoration in your parish.

3. Implore God's Help and Ask His Pardon

As individuals and families: Confession

In calling for a deep "ecological conversion," Pope Francis has emphasized the importance of examining one's own conscience, of recognizing one's sins against creation, however great or small. Seeing the interconnectedness of our world

leads to an understanding that "[e]very violation of solidarity and civic friendship harms the environment" (Caritas in Veritate, no. 51). We invite you to bring these sins to confession and to perform a spiritual work of mercy for our common home, such as an act of "grateful contemplation of God's world" (Laudato Si', no. 214).



As a community: Prayer Service

One final suggestion for this time is to organize a prayer service in your parish. The Laudato Si' Movement has an <u>official prayer book</u> that can provide inspiration for a service. As we approach the beautiful autumn season, holding this service outside may allow for a rich experience.

O God of the poor,
help us to rescue the abandoned
and forgotten of this earth,
who are so precious in your eyes...
God of love, show us our place in this world
as channels of your love
for all the creatures of this earth,
God of mercy, may we receive your forgiveness
and convey your mercy throughout our common home.
Praise be to you!
Amen.



Conozca sus Derechos en un Encuentro con ICE

Tiene derecho a

- Permanecer en silencio y negarse a responder preguntas de los agentes de ICE
- Negarse a abrir la puerta de una casa u oficina privada a agentes de ICE, si los agentes no tienen orden judicial, o tienen una orden judicial que no está firmada por un juez
- Negarse a permitir que los agentes de ICE, revisen sus pertenencias, si no tienen una orden firmada por un juez
- Hablar con un abogado

Si es arrestado por ICE

- Tiene derecho a permanecer en silencio, hablar con un abogado y llamar a su consulado
- No es necesario que proporcione ninguna información sobre su estado migratorio, lugar de nacimiento o antecedentes penales
- Primero, hable con un abogado!

Si ICE lo detiene en la calle

- Dígale a los agentes de ICE que no desea hablar con ellos y no responda ninguna pregunta
- Pregunte si puede irse. Si dicen "sí," aléjese. Si dicen "no," no responda ninguna pregunta
- Si revisan sus pertenencias, puede decir: "No doy mi consentimiento para este allanamiento"
- No firme ningún documento
- No entregue a ICE ningún documento falso o extranjero
- No huya ni se resista a un arresto
- No responda preguntas sobre su estatus migratorio o sobre dónde nació
- Solicite una identificación a los agentes para confirmar que son ICE

Si ICE llega a su casa

- Los agentes de ICE solo pueden entrar si alguien en la casa les da permiso (abre la puerta) O si tienen una orden judicial de un tribunal y firmada por un juez
- Una orden de ICE no les da permiso a los agentes para entrar a su hogar
- Mantenga la calma y el respeto
- Pregunté si son de ICE y que le muestren la orden judicial, pasándola por debajo de la puerta
- Si no tienen una orden judicial, diga: "No les doy permiso para entrar" y "No quiero responder ninguna pregunta"
- Si los agentes entran sin una orden judicial y sin su consentimiento, pídales que se vayan diciéndoles:
 "No les di permiso de entrar" y "No responderé ninguna pregunta"
- Si comienzan a revisar sus pertenencias, diga: "No doy mi consentimiento para este allanamiento"
- Si tienen una orden judicial, diga: "No quiero responder ninguna pregunta sin hablar con un abogado"
- No les dé a los agentes de ICE ningún documento extranjero como pasaportes, identificaciones consulares o visas vencidas.
- Si los agentes tienen una orden de detención para otra persona, no mientas sobre el paradero de esa persona.







Know Your Rights In an Encounter With ICE

YOU HAVE THE RIGHT TO

- Remain silent and refuse to answer any questions from ICE agents
- Refuse to open the door of a private home or office to ICE agents if the agents have no warrant, or have a warrant that is not signed by a judge
- · Refuse to let ICE agents look at your belongings if they do not have a warrant signed by a judge
- Speak to an attorney

If You Are Arrested by ICE

- You have the right to remain silent, speak to an attorney, and call your consulate
- You do not have to provide any information about your immigration status, place of birth, or criminal record
- · Speak to an attorney first!

If ICE Stops You On the Street

- Tell the ICE agents that you do not want to speak with them and do not answer any questions
- Ask if you are free to leave. If they say "yes," walk away.
 If they say "no," do not answer any questions.
- If they search your belongings, say, "I do not consent to this search"
- Do not sign any documents
- Do not give ICE any false or foreign documents
- Do not run away or resist an arrest
- Do not respond to questions about your immigration status or where you were born
- Ask the agents for ID to confirm they are ICE

If ICE Comes to Your House

- ICE agents can only enter if someone in the house gives them permission (opens the door) OR if they
 have a judicial warrant from a court and signed by a judge
- A warrant from ICE does not give agents permission to enter your home.
- Remain calm and respectful
- Ask if they are from ICE and to show you the judicial warrant by passing it under the door
- If they do not have a judicial warrant, say, "I do not give you permission to enter" and "I do not want to answer any questions"
- If the agents enter without a judicial warrant or your consent, ask them to leave and say, "I do not give
 you permission to enter" and "I will not answer any questions"
- If they begin to search your belongings, say, "I do not consent to this search"
- If they have a judicial warrant, say, "I do not want to answer any questions without talking to a lawyer"
- · Do not give ICE agents any foreign documents such as passports, consular ids, or expired visas
- If the agents have an arrest warrant for someone else, do not lie about the person's whereabouts
